From Awareness to Action: The continuum of outcome types

Intimate partner violence (IPV) and sexual violence (SV) prevention programs aim to impact many different kinds of outcomes from the individual to the societal level of the social ecology. Effective primary prevention strategies typically address awareness and knowledge of IPV/SV, but also aim to affect real changes in behavior, skills, policies, and environmental conditions. The table below illustrates different types of outcomes and how they align with

levels of the social ecology.
