Paula Roller Leaves Legacy of Greater Collaboration, Increased Awareness and New Shelter in Delaware



Paula Roller, Executive Director at Turning Point, will be retiring August 30, 2020.

Paula Roller is no stranger to passion or perseverance. For the past 26 years, she has been the Executive Director of the Marion-based domestic violence program, Turning Point, which serves six counties in Ohio, the largest territory served by a single domestic violence program in the state. Paula will retire on August 30, 2020, and she will be sorely missed. A timeline of her efforts is marked by increased local awareness around domestic violence, greater collaboration between the program, community resources and law enforcement, an additional shelter, and growth from a budget of about \$400,000 to a budget of \$1.5 million.

Work on Intersection of DV and Brain Injury **Featured in GAO Report**




violence was prominently featured in a newly released Government Accountability Office (GAO) report about the prevalence of brain injuries in victims of domestic violence. The GAO is a non-partisan agency that reports to Congress and often provides information at the request of congressional committees. The report, released on June 12, recommended that the U.S. Department of

Health and Human Services improve data collection on brain injuries from intimate partner violence. "With better data comes a better understanding of the overall prevalence of brain injuries resulting from intimate partner violence," the report said. "This, in turn, could help ensure that federal resources are allocated to the appropriate areas and used as efficiently and effectively as possible to address this public health issue."
