Member Programs Advocate for Increased Funding for DV Services during Advocacy Day


Representatives from ODVN member programs met with 54 legislators to advocate for increased state support for Ohio's DV programs, during ODVN's first annual Advocacy Day on Oct. 6. More than 50 participants from member programs across the state and ODVN staff participated.

They asked that Ohio's \$1 million domestic violence line item be increased to \$5 million annually. In 2019 the General Assembly included — for the first time — \$1 million in support for DV services. Advocates gave elected officials a <u>report</u> showing that the funds were used for general operating expenses.

About 60% of their visits were with Republican legislators and about 40% were with Democratic legislators. About 59% of the elected officials expressed strong support for


increasing the line item, while 41% of them said they were likely to support the
